Population / Space:

The Sheriff's work, duty, and operations have outpaced the facility.

In recent years, the jail's inmate population has been at or above the site's rated capacity.

In 2016, 2017, 2018, and 2019, the Review Committee found that "The Sheriff's work, duty, and operations" were and are "outpacing the facility."

In 2019, for some 5 days or so, the jail's population reached 205.

The Pope County Detention Center has housing capacity of 172; the site's operational capacity is about 137 (+/-) depending on housing trends and related aspects.

In 2019, the jail population on date of Review was 150 with an average daily population of 200.

In 2018, the jail population on date of Review was 185 with an average daily population of 185.

In 2017, the jail population on date of Review was 197 with an average daily population of 185.

In 2016, the jail population on date of Review was 161 with an average daily population of 187.

In 2015, the jail population on date of Review was 178 with an average daily population of 190.

In 2014, the jail population on date of Review was 171. (Prior to 2015, averages rates were not noted).

In 2013, the jail population on date of Review was 161.

In 2012, the jail population on date of Review was 161.

In 2011, the jail population on date of Review was 164.

In 2010, the jail population on date of Review was 168.

In 2009, the jail population on date of Review was 174 -182. (Notation that average population was 190)

In 2008, the jail population on date of Review was 162.

Due to lack of space, the facility does not have the space to typically house misdemeanor inmates.

Due to lack of space, on a typical day, a number of housing areas will be overpopulated with inmates.

Due to lack of space, the female housing area is almost always overpopulated.

Due to lack of space and the growing inmate population, the site often struggles with inmate housing goals, classification goals, and like aspects.

Due to lack of space, trustee status inmates are often housed in the site's multipurpose room area.

Due to lack of space, the site is in need of additional housing areas for inmates with disabilities and inmates with special needs.

Due to lack of space, the jail needs additional room / housing areas for booking and inmate processing purposes.

Due to lack of space with regard to the growing inmate population, the site needs additional room for inmate programming purposes.

Typically, some 65-70 percent of the inmate population consists of pre-trial felon inmates.

The growing inmate population further strains and ages the cell fixtures and facility components.

Currently, Pope County has and is working to early- release inmates as to address space issues. Despite these commendable and appreciated efforts, the jail stays overpopulated.

Physical Plant:

With the passage of time, a number of jail fixtures are aging and subject to ongoing and costly repairs.

With the passage of time, the site's heating / cooling system is in need of updates.

With the passage of time, a number of plumbing fixtures are now obsolete in terms of replacement / updates.

With the passage of time, a number of inner cell door fixtures are in need of updates.

With the passage of time, it appears that the camera system may be in need of an update.

With the passage of time, some power cords are now exposed.

With the passage of time, a number of ventilation issues / concerns have emerged within the facility. As such, a number of work / housing areas struggle with respect to air circulation and climate control – management.

With the passage of time, at least one work / storage area has aged out of service.

The site now has a new boiler.

General Review of 2019:

The health plan provides for an on-site nurse 12 hours per day. In addition, the plan provides for a visiting nurse practitioner. In addition to other benefits, the plan allows for both inmates and staff to stay within the secure site with regard to health care services.

The Review Committee commends the staff with regard to inmate programming. The staff, in partnership with Pope County Adult Education, offers a number of services and programs. The partnership provides for 2 educational professionals on site who provide services. The GED, as well as WAGE certificates, can promote inmate and community success.

The site does not house inmates under the age of 18. Typically, the facility houses some 35-40 Pope County – ADC-bound inmates.

Jail officers typically secure some 20 hours of continuing education per year. The agency training log is current and impressive. The agency provides a variety of training programs to staffers. The facility typically has 8 to 9 jail officers on duty. All new jail officers secure some 3 weeks of Field Training. The site administrator is a full-time certified / commissioned law enforcement officer.

The staff has an electronic inmate / staff activity documentation platform. The site is now host to video / on-site courtroom access / hearings.

The professional and knowledgeable staff oversees a clean facility.

The jail staff is doing a great job, despite the structural / physical plant limitations.

Conclusion:

In 2018 the Review Committee Stated.

"In reference to the ongoing matters, with regard to the lack of space, the growing inmate population, and jail components that are aged and / or obsolete:

The Review Committee encourages Pope County to again consider the creation of a Local Criminal Justice Coordinating Committee or like mechanism. A LCJCC or like approach can assist the community, agency, and facility in terms of jail population numbers, housing plans, long-term physical plant planning, and like aspects. A private and / or public consultant can assist the County in crafting a plan that is long-term, efficient, economical, and effective."

In 2019, Pope County launched a Jail Committee. The Committee has and is working in terms of solutions, options, ideas and like features. The Review Committee commends the County as the community prepares for the future.

Continued:

Request:	
The jail's population trends, the jail's lack of space, the jail's aged and obsolete fittings and more are a major and growing public safety issue.	
The current site has a number of safety concerns with respect to lack of space given the inmate population patterns.	
The work of the agency has outgrown the current jail.	
The overpopulated jail has a direct impact on county employee safety, inmate safety, agency goals, and community success.	
The Review Committee requests that the Pope County Sheriff's Office organize and craft an Improvement Plan with respect to jail operations.	
The Improvement Plan is due in December of 2020, the plan will include a prompt action start date as well as a budget / funding framework.
